PRESIDENT MAHAMA, LANDS MINISTER, AND CIVIL SOCIETY UNITE TO CHART BOLD PATH AGAINST ILLEGAL MINING

President John Dramani Mahama has convened a high-level dialogue at the Jubilee House, bringing together key Civil Society Organisations (CSOs), faith-based leaders, professional bodies, and mining associations to develop practical, lasting solutions to Ghana's persistent illegal mining menace.

The meeting underscored Government's renewed resolve to combat galamsey, which has ravaged farmlands, polluted major rivers, and endangered livelihoods across the country. Taking centre stage at the engagement, the Minister for Lands and Natural Resources, Hon. Emmanuel Armah-Kofi Buah (MP), delivered an in-depth presentation on the current state of the illegal mining crisis and outlined Government's comprehensive plan to tackle it.

He revealed that at the start of the year, Ghana faced a critical phase in the fight against illegal mining, a challenge that has not only tested environmental resilience but also the nation's governance and law enforcement structures.

Hon. Buah detailed five key approaches forming the backbone of the government's strategy which is, strengthening law enforcement through the National Anti-Illegal Mining Operations Secretariat (NAIMOS), reforming the licensing regime to promote accountability, restoring degraded lands through the Tree for Life initiative, rejuvenating polluted water bodies through Blue Water Guards Initiative, and implementing the Responsible Cooperative Mining and Skills Development Programme (rCOMSDEP) to formalize small-scale mining operations.

These reforms, he stated, reflect President Mahama's clear direction and unwavering political will to "restore order, rebuild confidence, and renew Ghana's natural heritage."

"These reforms are beginning to make a real difference," the Minister asserted, citing visible progress in forest reclamation and cleaner water systems in several regions. "But we know the road ahead is long. With President Mahama's guidance, my team and I are determined to stay the course until our rivers run clear and our forests recover their strength."

Civil society leaders at the meeting commended Government's proactive measures while issuing a call for stronger enforcement and greater transparency in the fight against illegal mining.

Their contributions, drawn from years of advocacy and community engagement, enriched the dialogue and reinforced the need for continued partnership between state and non-state actors in addressing the crisis.

In closing, Hon. Buah reaffirmed the Ministry's commitment to working hand in hand with civil society and all stakeholders to deliver on Government's charge to protect Ghana's environment for future generations. "Your vigilance keeps us sharp, and your partnership gives us strength," he said, pledging unrelenting dedication to ending "galamsey" and securing a sustainable future for the nation.



02 MINISTERIAL ADVISORY BOARD PAYS FAMILIARISATION VISIT TO FC

The Ministerial Advisory Board to the Ministry of Lands and Natural Resources (MLNR) has paid a working visit to the Forestry Commission (FC) to familiarise itself with the operations of the Commission and strengthen collaboration between the Ministry and its key implementing agency.

The visiting team, comprising members of the Board, the Secretary, and support staff, was warmly received by the Chairman of the FC Board, Professor Martin Oteng-Ababio, along with the Acting Chief Executive, Dr. Hugh C. A. Brown, his deputies, and members of the Executive Management Team.

In his welcome address, Professor Oteng-Ababio noted that the Forestry Commission is legally mandated to regulate the utilisation, conservation, and management of Ghana's forest and wildlife resources, in addition to coordinating related policies. He acknowledged that while the Commission carries out its duties with "joy and enthusiasm," it is not without challenges. He appealed to the Advisory Board for support in addressing these challenges to help the Commission effectively deliver on its mandate.

Responding on behalf of the visiting delegation, Mr. Israel Ackah Esq., Co-Chair of the Advisory Board, explained that the purpose of the visit was to foster meaningful engagement between the Ministry and the agencies under its supervision. He emphasised the Board's commitment to learning about the Commission's work and offering its full cooperation to support the government's broader environmental vision.

Dr. Hugh C.A. Brown, Acting Chief Executive of the Forestry Commission, delivered a comprehensive presentation on the structure, mandate, and operations of the Commission. He explained that the Commission operates under an 11-member Board and is structured into three main divisions and 17 units, employing 4,151 staff of which 81% are men.

Highlighting key achievements in 2025, Dr. Brown stated that by mid-year, Ghana had welcomed 374,311 ecotourism visitors. In efforts to restore degraded landscapes, 9,707 hectares of plantations had been established. Additionally, nine forest reserves were reclaimed from illegal miners, resulting in the seizure of 190 excavators, 16 vehicles, and the arrest of 345 suspects.

Other major milestones included the launch of the Tree for Life Reforestation Initiative, the issuance of FLEGT timber licenses, making Ghana the first African country to do so and the signing of a landmark REDD+ partnership with Tullow Ghana, projected to offset 600,000 tonnes of carbon emissions annually. The Commission also participated in the 5th World Teak Conference in India and invested in ecotourism infrastructure, including the construction of chalets, canopy walkways, and a bird-watching tower. The year has seen the official launch of the 2025 Closed Season at the Gbele Resource Reserve and the second matriculation of students into the Certificate in Natural Resource Management Programme at the Forestry Commission Training Centre.

Despite these achievements, Dr. Brown acknowledged persistent challenges, including inadequate logistics for field operations, security threats posed by heavily armed illegal miners, insufficient funding for reclamation and reforestation, and lengthy judicial processes for prosecuting forest offenders.

He outlined key priorities for the rest of 2025, including the launch of the Ghana Forest Landscape Restoration Strategy, implementation of the 2024–2028 Strategic Plan, piloting the Domestic Timber Trade Network, and enacting regulations to operationalise the Wildlife Resources Management Act, 2023. Looking ahead, the Ag. Chief Executive mentioned that the

Commission plans to establish operational camps for staff, review the Forestry Commission Act to potentially restructure the agency into a paramilitary institution for more effective enforcement, expand ecotourism through public-private partnerships, and implement payment for ecosystem services to support biodiversity conservation, watershed protection, and climate change mitigation.

The visit concluded with an interactive session where members of the Ministerial Advisory Board posed questions to deepen their insight on the operations and challenges of the FC.



03 FC BOARD PAYS FIELD VISIT TO SAKUMO RAMSAR SITE

The Governing Board of the Forestry Commission (FC) has undertaken a field visit to the Sakumo Ramsar Site to explore its potential for ecotourism development and to assess the extent of encroachment threatening the Protected Area. The visit formed part of ongoing efforts by the Commission to promote sustainable management and utilisation of Ghana's wetland resources.

The delegation was accompanied by Dr. Joseph Boakye Esq., Executive Director of the Wildlife Division (WD); Mr. Eric Atta Kusi, Manager of Wetlands, WD; Mr. Paul Asimeng, Site Manager of the Sakumo Ramsar Site; and officers from the Rapid Response Team (RTT).

The tour commenced at the Site's Administrative Office, where the Board inspected a newly refurbished accommodation facility for the RTT. The facility, developed under the directive of the Chief Executive, Dr. Hugh C. A. Brown, is intended to ensure the RTT is permanently stationed at the Site to enhance protection against encroachment.


During the tour, the Board visited key areas within the core zone, including a viewing tower overlooking the Sakumo Lagoon, a picnic station, bird-nesting site, and a resting area for fisherfolk. Noting the deteriorated condition of the viewing tower, the Board proposed its reconstruction. Commissioner Richard Duah Nsenkyire, representing the Timber Industry on the FC Board, pledged to donate all the wood required for the construction of the new structure.

The Board also recommended the modernisation of the picnic and fisherfolk resting areas and suggested the introduction of user fees to attract visitors while generating additional revenue for the Commission.

A drive-through assessment of the buffer and core zones followed, during which members evaluated the boundaries and the extent of encroachment.

Measures will be put in place, not only to curb encroachment but also position the Sakumo Ramsar Site as a model for eco-friendly tourism and community engagement in wetland conservation.





04 THIRD TIMBER VALIDATION COMMITTEE ORIENTED

Members of the newly inaugurated third Timber Validation Committee (TVC) have undergone a comprehensive two-day orientation. This exercise, held in the Western Region, sought to equip the Committee with firsthand insights into the full spectrum of Ghana's timber legality system, from forest operations to export protocols.

The TVC, established under L.I. 2254 (Regulation 32), is mandated to oversee the verification and validation of timber license applications, ensure compliance with Ghana's timber legality framework, and facilitate the resolution of industry-related complaints. The Committee plays a crucial role in supporting the implementation of the Ghana Timber Legality Assurance System (GhLAS), supervising timber licensing for both domestic and international markets, and making key recommendations towards the issuance of FLEGT licenses for timber exports to the European Union, thereby promoting transparency, legality, and sustainability within Ghana's timber sector.

The orientation began at the Subri Forest Reserve, a key timber production area. The Committee was introduced to forest inventory techniques and sustainable harvesting practices by Nana Poku Bosompim, Western Regional Manager of the Forest Services Division (FSD). He explained the Reserve's compartmentalised mapping system and criteria for tree selection, noting that only trees with a minimum diameter of 50 cm are included in stock surveys for the Ghana Wood Tracking System (GWTS). He also stressed the importance of accurate species cataloguing, traceability, and compliance with

the mandatory 5% Social Responsibility Agreement (SRA) between timber companies and local communities before any harvesting begins.

Later, the delegation visited the Takoradi Port, where timber is prepared for export. Mr. Ferhat Akkaya, General Manager of Yilport ATSL-Takoradi, explained the Port's role in logistics, clarifying that legal clearances are managed by Ghana Customs and the Timber Industry Development Division (TIDD). A Customs Officer, Mr. Yaw Sedro, gave an overview of the export inspection process, highlighting that all timber shipments are jointly vetted by the Customs Division of the Ghana Revenue Authority (GRA), Ghana Ministry of National Security, and the Bureau of National Investigations (BNI). Once cleared, containers are sealed and handed to shipping lines, ensuring only legally sourced timber is exported.

On the second day, the orientation took place at the Western Serene Atlantic Hotel in Takoradi. Hon. Fiifi Buckman, Chairman of the TVC opened the session by reflecting on the previous day's fieldwork. Dr. Hugh C.A. Brown, Chief Executive of the Forestry Commission, provided an overview of the Commission's mandate and structure, which includes the FSD, Wildlife Division, and TIDD. Participants received series of technical briefings on how each Division supports the Ghana Timber Legality Assurance System (GhLAS), reinforcing the legal and scientific foundations of sustainable forestry in Ghana.

Experts from the Forestry Commission highlighted the operational roles of their respective divisions. Dr. Gordon Kofi Sarfo-Adu, Ag. Executive Director, FSD, explained how timber harvesting is regulated through sustainable yield plans. Similarly, Mr. Yaw Atuahene Nyako, Director of the Resource Management Support Centre, detailed the scientific basis for the 40-year timber harvesting cycle per compartment.

Dr. Richard Gyimah, Ag. Director of TIDD, also took his turn to discuss the Division's role in timber inspection, grading, and issuance of export licenses and FLEGT certificates, emphasising their oversight from transportation to trade. Dr. Frank Ankomah, Verification Manager, Timber Validation Department (TVD) outlined the Department's auditing and inspection functions, particularly its response to system red flags. Dr. Godfred Bempah of the Wildlife Division, addressed issues on Convention for International Trade of Endangered Species (CITES) compliance for restricted species in timber exports.



The day concluded with a presentation by Mr. Clement Kojo Akapame Esq. of Taylor Crabbe, Legal Consultant for FLEGT, who led a practical session on managing industry complaints, reinforcing the TVC's role under Legislative Instrument (L.I.) 2254. Participants then toured a local sawmill to observe first-hand the process of converting raw logs into finished timber products.

In his closing remarks, Hon. Fiifi Buckman expressed gratitude to facilitators and reaffirmed the Committee's commitment to safeguarding forest resources. He stated that the orientation impacted the TVC, leaving the members well-resourced for duty.



05 ZAMBIAN DELEGATION PAYS LEARNING VISIT TO FC

The Acting (Ag.) Deputy Chief Executive (D. C.E.), Mr. Elikem Kotoko, along with the Executive Management Team (EMT) of the Forestry Commission (FC), have welcomed a high-level delegation from Zambia on a learning visit aimed at exploring best practices in sustainable natural resource management. The visit forms part of Zambia's efforts to develop policies for the effective management and monetization of its natural resources.

In his welcome address, Mr. Kotoko welcomed the Zambian officials and expressed hope that the engagement would foster stronger bilateral cooperation and yield practical insights. Speaking on behalf of the Zambian team, the leader of the delegation, Brigadier - General Chishala Mulenga, acknowledged Ghana's success in forest governance. He stated that the purpose of their visit was to learn about FC as Zambia was in the process of developing a policy to aid in the sustainable management and monetisation of their natural resources. "It is an area where Ghana has excelled", he said, and declared the team's interest in learning how Ghana is tackling the canker of illegal mining as well.

As part of the visit, Mr. Kwame Agyei, Manager, Plantations Investment, Forest Services Division (FSD) of FC, provided an overview of the Commission's organisational structure, operational divisions, and key achievements. Notably, he highlighted Ghana's landmark status as the first African country and second globally to have issued Forest Law Enforcement, Governance and Trade (FLEGT) licenses, ensuring timber exports to the EU meet strict legal standards.

Mr. Agyei also shared progress in ecotourism and conservation, citing 374,311 visitors to FC-managed sites and the establishment of 9,707 hectares of new forest plantations. Additionally, he referenced the Emission Reductions Purchase Agreement with Tullow Oil, a strategic REDD+ initiative aimed at offsetting 600,000 tonnes of carbon annually.

However, he acknowledged several persistent challenges, including limited logistics, underfunding of reforestation efforts, and delays in prosecuting forest-related offences.

Further presentations by Mr. Yaw Kwakye, Director of Operations for Natural Forests, FSD, highlighted the severe threat of illegal mining (galamsey) within Ghana's forest reserves. He revealed that 45 out of 288 reserves have been affected, with nine facing critical degradation. He cited inadequate regulation of equipment (particularly excavators), abuse of mining permits, and weak enforcement capacity as key issues in dealing with "galamsey". According to him, 845 arrests were made, but only 35 led to successful prosecutions between 2023 and 2024, , underscoring the need for judicial reform.

To combat these challenges, Mr. Kwakye outlined ongoing government-backed initiatives including the deployment of security forces under the National Anti-Illegal Mining Operations Secretariat (NAIMOS), the formation of the Blue Water Brigade, proposed special courts for illegal mining, increased funding, and greater involvement from civil society.

The session concluded with open discussions, knowledge exchange, and a photo session to mark the occasion and strengthen ties between the two countries.



24H+ SECRETARIAT ENGAGES FORESTRY COMMISSION ON COLLABORATIVE GROWTH INITIATIVES

A two-member delegation from the 24-Hour Economy (24H+) Secretariat has paid a working visit to the Forestry Commission (FC) to explore potential areas of collaboration in advancing Ghana's sustainable and inclusive economic transformation agenda.

The delegation, comprising of Ms. Manuella Sekyi, Climate Lead, Programmes Officer, and Mr. Kyeretwie Opoku, Coordinator of the Secretariat, was warmly received by the Deputy Chief Executive of the Commission, Mr. Elikem Kotoko, and members of the Executive Management Team (EMT).

In his welcome address, Mr. Kotoko described the visit as a valuable opportunity to educate the Secretariat with the Commission's mandate and operations, while fostering partnerships to drive the 24H+ vision of addressing Ghana's economic challenges through innovative, practical solutions.

Ms. Sekyi, in a detailed presentation, outlined the 24H+ Programme's goal to transform Ghana into a productive, industrialised, and job-creating economy. She highlighted flagship projects such as the Volta Economic Corridor; Legon Pharmaceutical Innovation Park; Agroecological Parks (Agbleduwo); Kumasi Machinery & Technology Park, and the National Creators' Academy. All these, she noted are designed to enhance self-reliance, local production, and sustainable employment within a robust investment framework.

A presentation on FC, which was delivered by Dr. Joseph Yaw Appiah-Gyapong, Director, Climate Change, showcased

the Commission's leadership in forest-based climate action and sustainable resource management. He emphasised FC's achievements in implementing the REDD+ Programme, its strong governance systems, and Ghana's success in securing \$21.7 million in results-based carbon finance under the Cocoa Forest REDD+ Programme. Dr. Appiah-Gyapong reaffirmed the Commission's commitment to partnering with the 24H+ Secretariat in building a low-carbon, climate-resilient, and inclusive economy.

The engagement concluded with an interactive session, where both parties shared insights and agreed on designating a liaison officer to strengthen communication and collaboration. The meeting ended on a cordial note, marked by a group photo to symbolise the beginning of a promising partnership.



The Greater Accra Chapter of the Forestry Commission Ladies Association (FCLA) in collaboration with the Human Resource Directorate of the Forestry Commission (FC) have joined the global campaign against breast cancer with an event held under the theme, “Know Early, Act Early – No Woman Left Behind.” The program sought to raise awareness about breast cancer and encouraged all participants to undergo screening, emphasising that early detection saves lives.

Delivering the welcome address on behalf of Mrs. Valerie Fum-mey-Nassah, National President, FCLA, Mrs. Mary Balkono, National Vice President, FCLA, extended warm greetings and best wishes to participants. She mentioned that the gathering was not only about health but also about the unity and empowerment of women within the Commission. “A healthy woman is a productive woman,” she declared as she encouraged full participation in the screening exercise and the voting for new executives of the Greater Accra Chapter of FCLA, which formed part of the day’s activities.

Dr. Abdul Nassir Abubakar, Acting Director of Human Resources, delivered a thought-provoking message that challenged traditional perceptions. He declared breast cancer as a “100% issue that affects men”, explaining that men are equally affected whenever a woman in their life is diagnosed with the disease. “Men and women live together; men cannot do without women,” he stated. “When a woman suffers, a man suffers too.” He called on all men to actively participate in the fight against breast cancer, emphasising that a life free of breast cancer is a shared responsibility.

Matron Michelle Hammond from the Lapaz Community Hospital Annex educated participants on the importance of early detection, describing it as the key to saving lives. She explained that breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in Ghana, accounting for approximately 4,500 deaths annually.

She advised women to perform self-breast examinations once every month and to seek medical attention if they notice any unusual changes. She also discussed causes including genetics, hormonal factors, obesity, alcohol use, and radiation exposure, while highlighting that treatment and recovery depend heavily on early diagnosis.

The Matron reassured women that even after surgery, breast reconstruction or the use of prosthetic “jelly” options are available to help restore confidence and well-being.

The second part of the day’s activities involved the election and induction of eight(8) new executives for the Greater Accra Chapter of FCLA as the tenure of the previous executives had ended. The newly elected executives include were:



FCLA UPPER EAST CHAPTER MARKS BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

As part of activities marking this year's Breast Cancer Awareness Month, the Upper East Regional Chapter of the Forestry Commission Ladies Association (FCLA) has organised a sensitisation exercise to educate women on the importance of regular screening and early detection of breast cancer.

The event was hosted at the Church of Pentecost Hospital (COPH) in Bolgatanga.

Speaking at the event, the Upper East Regional Manager of the Forest Services Division (FSD), Mr. George Agbenowoshi, commended the initiative and encouraged participants to prioritise their health through regular medical check-ups. He also urged the ladies to extend the awareness message to their families and communities.

The Hospital Manager of COPH, Rev. Dr. Kwame Adjei-Amonfo, commended the FCLA for the collaboration and emphasised the hospital's commitment to promoting preventive healthcare. As part of the programme, he led counselling sessions focused on breast health and early detection.



A midwife at the hospital, Madam Sarah Wuni, educated participants on the importance of self-examination and prompt medical attention for any unusual breast changes. She noted that factors such as age and genetics increase the risk of developing breast cancer. She added that regular screening and mammogram tests are crucial, especially for women over 40 years.
